THIS Book records the names of fifty-six Scholars and Old Scholars of Trinity Grammar School, Wood Green, London, N.22. who lost their lives in the Second World War, 1939-1945. It includes one name not inscribed on the bronze memorial plaque in the School Hall: that of an Old Boy killed in Palestine in the trouble following the end of the War.

Compiled from School records and photographs, and from information supplied and photographs lent by relatives, the Book has been prepared under the direction of the Head Master, Dr Emrys E. Jones, by the Editor of the School Magazine, Mr E. J. Brandon, with help from members of the Staff, particularly from the Art teachers, Miss M. P. Jobson and Mr M. Penney, and by The Old Trinity Scholars' Association (Secretary, Mr D. S. MacPhee; Treasurer, Mr A. Eustance), from whose members suggestions have come in particular from Miss E. M. Kent (Country Club), Mr J. C. W. Barrett (Cricket Club), Mr R. D. W. French (Hockey Club), Mr H. F. Simmonds (Football Club), and Mr R. Skipworth (Dramatic Society). The co-operation of the present senior scholars has also been willingly given.

This Book and the Bronze Plaque in the Hall together form the School's War Memorial. A leather-bound copy of the Book is preserved in the School Library.

Jack Archer Akers

At School 1932-1937. Prefect.

Clerk in London and North-Eastern Railway.

April 1942, Royal Air Force. Made approximately twenty operational flights over Germany, including Berlin.

August 29, 1944, failed to return from operational flight over Königsberg.



John Allen



At School 1924-1929. Prefect.

Member of Old Scholars' Country Club.

Clerk with the Asiatic Petroleum Company. Was three years at Caracas.

December 14, 1940, torpedoed while returning home on S.S. *Western Prince* to join Royal Air Force.

Kenneth Douglas Babington-Browne

At School 1931-1935. Prefect, Captain of St David's House, member of School First Cricket and Football Elevens.

Member of Old Boys' Cricket and Football Clubs.

Clerk with Eagle Star and British Dominions Insurance Company.

March 19, 1939, joined Royal Air Force. March 1940, Sergeant-Observer. Continuous operational flights from September 1939 to August 1940. September 1940, Navigation Instructor in Scotland. Warrant Officer, later Pilot-Officer.

March 9, 1943, missing from raid on Nuremberg.
April 1943, reported killed. Buried in Bavaria.



Edward Ronald Backhouse



At School 1932-1937. Gained Bronze Medallion of the Royal Life Saving Society, and walking record at Bridport School Camp.

Shipping clerk with Messrs P. R. Buchanan, tea traders.

August 1940, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant Pilot. Thirteen operational flights. Was Captain of his plane after six operations.

October 10-11, 1941, missing after raid over Ruhr. Later reported killed and buried in Cologne Military Cemetery.

Tom Banks

At School 1915-1920.

Twelve years' service in Royal Navy.

August 31, 1939, called up as Stoker Petty Officer. Served in *H.M.S. Dolphin* till September 21, 1939, at R.N. Barracks, Chatham, till October 12, 1939, when drafted to *H.M.S. Veteran*, which operated in home waters till March 7, 1942, and then between New Halifax, Boston, and Newport.

September 26, 1942, torpedoed in *H.M.S. Veteran* in North Atlantic.



Peter Bligh

At School 1932-1937.

Clerk with The Gas Meter Co., Ltd.

September 1940, Royal Navy. January 1941, Leading Naval Airman.

September 1941, Sub-Lieutenant, R.N.V.R.(A). Fleet Air Arm Pilot.

Mentioned in Despatches posthumously for gallantry and devotion to duty.

February 12, 1942, piloted one of the six Swordfish aircraft which attacked the *Scharnhorst* and *Gneisenau* as they passed through the English Channel. All the aircraft were lost.



Estelle Belasco



At School 1935-1940.

Clerk with Messrs John Lewis and Co., Ltd., and afterwards in the Admiralty.

December 14, 1944, killed by rocket (V2). Mother and sister also killed.

David Brush



At School 1939-1944.

Student at Hornsey School of Art.

April 30, 1946, joined the Royal Marines.

November 23, 1946, transferred Palestine Police Force.

February 1948, killed in Palestine.

Arthur James Carnehan

At School 1933-1936.

Clerk with Messrs Haes and Sons, Old Broad Street. 1940, employed in Civil Defence, Wood Green.

October 3, 1941, enlisted in Rifle Brigade. Lance-Corporal. Junior Instructor at Small Arms School, Netheravon, Wiltshire.

February 2, 1945, died of cerebral concussion at The General Hospital, Odstock, Salisbury.



Henry Catch



At School 1933-1938. Probationer-Prefect. Vice-Captain of St Patrick's House.

Junior Draughtsman with Andrew Fraser. Consulting Engineer; later Draughtsman with Messrs J. A. Prestwick, Tottenham.

August 1941, joined Royal Air Force, trained in United States and Canada.

March 1943, Pilot-Officer.

May 12-13, 1943, missing after raid on Duisberg.

George Edmund Henry Ceeney

At School 1932-1937.

Draughtsman in Post Office.

January 20, 1941, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant Pilot. Operational flights over Germany in 1942.

November 28, 1942, missing after mine-laying in Mediterranean.



Ernest Charles Cowell



At School 1929-1933.

Member of Old Boys' Hockey Club.

Clerk with Messrs Lumsden and Co., Stockbrokers, and later with Messrs Thos. Cook and Son, Ltd.

April 18, 1940, joined Army. Corporal.

November 1940, posted overseas. Served with The Buffs in Malta throughout the siege.

November 12, 1943, killed at Leros.

Dennis Arthur Crowsley

At School 1933-1938. Member of School First Football Eleven.

Clerk with Messrs Metropolitan-Vickers Electrical Co., Ltd.

November 10, 1941, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant. Wireless operator-air gunner.

July 4, 1943, missing after raid over Cologne—his first operational flight. Buried in Military Cemetery, Cologne.



Eric Frederick Curtis



At School 1933-1939.

Clerk with Messrs Burge, Warren and Ridley, Ltd., Bankers, and later with United Trust, Ltd., Bankers.

July, 1941, joined Royal Air Force, and was drafted to America in September for training. Returned to England in May 1942, passing as Pilot. September 1942, posted to Bomber Command, Captain of a Stirling. Made nineteen operational flights over Germany and occupied countries. February, 1943, commissioned Pilot Officer.

June 22, 1943, killed on raid over Krefeld. Buried in English Park Cemetery, Hoboken, Antwerp, Belgium.

Victor George Davies

At School 1928-1934.

Member of Old Boys' Football Club.

Clerk in Milk Marketing Board.

Gained Silver Medal of West End Amateur Football Association.

February 15, 1940, joined Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, first as Accounts Clerk, later Company Clerk, then volunteered for 2nd S. Staffords—the first Glider Airborne Regiment. Lance-corporal. Served in North Africa and Sicily.

July 9, 1943, killed in action—glider down in sea.



Geoffrey Arthur Deans



At School 1928-1934.

Member of Old Boys' Hockey Club.

Clerk with London and Manchester Insurance Company, later with Messrs Thomas Cook and Son.

Endeavoured to join Royal Air Force, but was rejected on account of eyesight. 1940, joined Army.

February 17, 1941, died of pneumonia on active service.

Alan Richard Downer

At School 1930-1933.

Employed in his father's fish-monger's business.

August 1939, joined Royal Air Force. Pilot Officer: Test Pilot.

July 20, 1940, engaged on secret testing of new aircraft. New machine crashed in flames near Edinburgh. Died July 21.



Ronald Charles George Evans



At School 1932-1937.

Clerk with Press Association, later in Health Department, London County Council.

September 1, 1941, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant, Bomber in No. 75 (N.Z.) Squadron. Took part in air operations over Germany.

July 30-31, 1943, failed to return home from an attack on Remscheid.

Leslie William Finch

At School 1925-1930. Prefect. Games Captain of St George's House, member of First School Football Eleven. Represented School in Stamford Bridge (Middlesex County) Sports.

Clerk in Colonial Mutual Life Assurance Society, Ltd.

From outbreak of war in London A.R.P.

June 3, 1940, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant. Served in North Africa, Malta, Sicily, Italy. Held 1939-45 Star, Africa Star with North Africa Clasp, Italy Star, Defence Medal, and War Medal.

November 5, 1945, killed in air crash, returning home for first leave from Italy.



John Ernest French



At School 1931-1936.

Clerk with Messrs John Morgan and Co., Tailors.

1939, Volunteered for Royal Air Force for six years. Wireless operator-air gunner. June 26, 1941, sailed out East.

July 5, drowned when ship was torpedoed in Atlantic.

Leslie John Herbert Gordon

At School 1925-1930.

Accountant with Messrs Vickers and Winder. Chartered Accountants.

September 1940, enlisted in Royal Artillery. Went overseas in December 1942, and served in Middle East Force until he landed in Sicily on first day of operations.

February 8, 1944, killed in action at Anzio Beachhead.



John Raymond Gosney



At School 1936-1937.

Joined Royal Air Force as boy before the War.

January 1942, promoted Corporal, Wireless Mechanic. Later, promoted Sergeant.

January 1, 1945, died of wounds while on active service at Eindhoven, Holland.

James Laurence Myhill Grint

At School 1935-1938. Captain of St George's House, member of School First Football Eleven.

Member of Old Boys' Football Club.

Clerk in Barclay's Bank, Ltd.

May 1938, enlisted in the 1st/7th Middlesex Regiment (T.A.)

January 1940, France; advance beyond Brussels; left Dunkirk June 3, 1940.

April 1941, transferred to Intelligence Corps. Sergeant. Served in Iraq; then in Wavell's advance from Egypt to Benghazi and back, via Tobruk, to El Alamein; then with Montgomery's Eighth Army from Egypt to Tunis, Sicily, Calabria, Cassino, Rome and on to Florence. Wounded in Florence on August 6, 1944.

October 23, 1944, died in the Royal Hospital, Sheffield, from wounds received in Italy.



William Victor Habgood



At School 1933-1937.

Clerk with Liverpool Victoria Insurance Company.

February 14, 1941, Royal Air Force. Wireless Operator in Tactical Air Force. Leading Aircraftman.

July 26, 1945, died of illness contracted on active service.

Eric Arthur Lascelles Hardman

At School 1924-1929. Probationer-Prefect.

Member of Old Boys' Hockey Club.

Clerk with London Passenger Transport Board, Statistical Department.

October 10, 1940, Royal Air Force. Trained in Canada. Pilot-Officer—first in all sections in commission examination. Seventeen operational flights.

June 7-8, 1942, failed to return after raid on Essen. Buried in Bocholt, Westphalia; later moved to Reichwald Forest.



Bertram Arthur Headland



At School 1932-1936.

Member of Old Boys' Hockey Club.

Clerk with Messrs George Ascott and Co., Stockbrokers.

August 11, 1939, joined Royal Air Force.

July 1940, Sergeant-Observer, Bomber Command.

Number of operational flights not known, but was at least twenty-one.

February 1941, posted to Officers' Training Unit at Lossiemouth as instructor.

May 15, 1941, killed in flying accident near Banff.

Norman Ernest Charles Howe

At School 1934-1937.

Clerk with Scouts' Friendly Society, later Draughtsman with Stent Pre-Cast Construction Company, Westminster.

During 1940 served with Merchant Navy in Norwegian ship, S.S. Senta, as seaman.

August 1941, joined Royal Navy. October 1941, transferred to Fleet Air Arm. Air Gunner. Leading-Airman. Recommended three times for commission, and had accepted.

May 16, 1942, died instantly after crash landing near Weymouth. Buried in Royal Naval Cemetery, Portland, with full Naval honours.



William Walter Hughes



At School 1931-1936.

Clerk with Messrs Schofield and Betts, later with Messrs Smith, Rice and Co., Stockbrokers.

July 22, 1940, joined Royal Air Force. Sergeant-Observer. In Middle East Command. Had only two flights to complete before returning to this country.

July 2, 1942, missing after night-flight in Egypt.

At School 1927-1933.

Clerk with London General Insurance Company, and then with Messrs Sherwood and Co., Parliamentary Agents for Private Bills.

April 3, 1940, Royal Air Force. Sergeant Observer.

March 13, 1941, killed while on night flying at Andover — the second time up at night.



Grahame Cameron Macdonald

At School 1932-1936.

Clerk with Messrs Bradbury, Greatorex and Co., Ltd.

April 11, 1939, joined 2nd Battalion The London Scottish. Engaged in secret Commando work.

May 22, 1943, commission in The Buffs (Royal East Kent Regiment).

September 26, 1944, died of wounds received in action in North West Europe.



Donald Loyd



At School 1932-1935.

Junior Assistant with Messrs John Kavanagh, then with Messrs Warrington. January 1938, signalman on London and North - Eastern Railway.

September 1941, Royal Air Force. Trained in Canada. January 1942 to August 1942. Sergeant Air-Gunner.

December 7, 1942, died from burns sustained from crash while landing on aerodrome previous day.

John Leonard Mitchell



At School 1932-1937.

Clerk with London Passenger Transport Board.

October 12, 1937, joined Territorial Unit at Hornsey. March 29, 1941, Royal Air Force. Sergeant-Pilot.

June 1, 1942, failed to return after raid on Bonn.

Ronald Alan Moody

At School 1928-1933.

Clerk with Gordon Woodroff and Co., Ltd.
Organist of Alexandra Park Congregational Church.

January 1940, Private in Somerset Light Infantry.
September 1940, transferred to Gold Coast and posted to Gold Coast Regiment. Corporal, R.W.A.F.F.

September 8, 1942, died of fever at Gold Coast.



Ronald Victor Moore



At School 1931-1936. Prefect.
Captain of St Patrick's House.
Member of First Football and Cricket Teams, Holder of Football Colours, Swimming Champion.

Member of Old Boys' Football Club.

Clerk in Queensland National Bank.

January 1939, Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve.

June 1940, R.A.F. Pilot-Bomber.

June 1941, F/Sgt Instructor, Officers' Training Unit.

May 1942, Flying-Officer.

Took part in thirty-three Operational flights.

April 22, 1943, killed on active service. Buried with full honours at Brookwood Cemetery.

Victor George John Morriss

At School 1923-1926.

In father's building and decorating business.

September 1939, called up in Territorial Army. Bombardier in Royal Artillery. Served in Iraq.

May 6, 1943, died of fever on active service.



Robert George Munson



At School 1927-1933. Prefect.

Junior with Messrs Harrod, Ltd., Knightsbridge.

Sergeant in 5th Queen's Royal Regiment.

July 16, 1941, killed by enemy action at Margate.

Malcolm Richard Peter Oxley

At School 1928-1935.

Clerk in Westminster Bank.

1940, joined Royal Air Force.
Pilot-Officer.

July 3, 1941, killed on the last
night of his training for night-
flying operations.



Donald Leslie Pitt

At School 1930-1933.

Musical Instrument Maker.

September 1939, called up after
being in Territorial Army for
six months. Sergeant in Royal
Artillery. Served in North
Africa.

November 21, 1942, died of
wounds received in action.



Donald Penn



At School 1924-1930.

Clerk with London County
Council.

January 21, 1941, joined Royal
Air Force. Leading Aircraft-
man.

September 1942, died of typhoid
fever at Calcutta.

Albert Henry Randell



At School 1929-1934. Prefect.
Captain of St George's House.

Clerk with Reinforcement Con-
structions, Reinforced Concrete
Engineers, and from April 29,
1935, with Messrs Hichens
Harrison, Woolston and Co.,
Stockbrokers.

Joined Royal Navy. Lieutenant.
Served in cruisers in the Arctic
and in the North and South
Atlantic.

1940, transferred to "little
ships." Served for 3½ years in
Mediterranean in M.L.'s and
M.T.B.'s, then in English Chan-
nel in command of a M.L.
landing agents on the French
coast.

May 28, 1944, torpedoed in
English Channel.

Charles Samuel Richardson

At School 1921-1923.

Assistant Manager, Engineer Tools.

March 31, 1941, joined Royal Army Service Corps.
September 16, 1941, embarked for Singapore.
February 14, 1942, taken prisoner of war.

October 10, 1943, died of tropical disease in prisoner of war camp in Burma.
Buried in Chungkai Military Cemetery, N.W. Bangkok.



Herbert William Joseph Roberts

At School 1931-1938. Prefect, Captain of St Patrick's House, Member of First Football and Cricket Teams, School Captain.

Member of Old Boys' Football Club.

Clerk in electrical equipments firm in City.

August 1940, joined Welsh Guards.
September 1942, gained commission in Royal Corps of Signals. Acting Captain.

August 1944, killed in France.



Richard Rilstone



At School, 1931-1936.

Clerk with Messrs Foster Porter, later with King's Engineering Works, Hitchin, Herts.

March 1942, joined Army. Herts. and Beds. Regiment, then transferred to Royal Army Service Corps.
Served in South Africa and Singapore. At capitulation was interned at Changai Camp.

August 1945, died in captivity in Kuching, North Borneo.
Buried in Labuan War Cemetery, N.N.E. Brunei Town, Borneo.

Richard Charles Selby



At School 1922-1927. Prefect, First Eleven Football Captain, Vice-Captain of School.

Clerk with Henley's Telegraph Company.

September 1940, Royal Air Force. Trained in Canada. Twenty-five operational flights. Flight-sergeant Navigator.

February 3, 1943, missing over Germany while flying Stirling bomber.

Vivien Nellie Sellwood

At School 1919-1923.

Manageress of photographer's business.

March 15, 1941, killed by bomb which fell on bus.



Vera Beatrice Sharman



At School 1924-1930. Prefect, Vice-Captain of St Andrew's House.

Secretary with Messrs Osmond and Matthews, Ltd., Hardware Factors. Member of Choir of Bowes Methodist Church, and secretary of Hockey Club there.

March 15, 1941, while travelling home on bus from a Social Service meeting at Willoughby Road Methodist Church, was bombed, injured, and taken to hospital: collapsed after recovery following blood transfusion.

James Sills

At School 1931-1933.

Clerk with Messrs H. B. Rogers, Ltd., Electrical Manufacturers, and later in the catering department, Alexandra Palace.

August 9, 1937, Royal Air Force, Pilot-Officer.

From August, 1938, to September, 1939, stationed at Alexandria.

From outbreak of war in Coastal and Bomber Commands. Wireless-Operator, Air-Gunner, Signals Officer. Took part in forty-nine operational flights. Mentioned in Despatches.

March 24, 1944, crashed and was killed instantly on operational flight over Bergheim and Bonn on the Rhine.



Bryan Donald Songest



At School 1932-1937. Gained Bronze Medallion of Royal Life Saving Society.

Salesman on the Corn Exchange; employed by Messrs White, Tomkins, and Courage, Ltd., Millers and Maltsters.

September 3, 1939, enlisted in R.A.M.C. Sergeant. Awarded Certificate of Merit by Commander in Chief, Home Forces.

1942, commissioned in Royal Armoured Corps. Drafted to Italy as Lieutenant, 12th Royal Tank Regiment.

April 19, 1945, killed in action in Italy.

Ronald William Soper

At School 1929-1933.

Junior Clerk with Linen Thread Co., Ltd., later Inspector, Middlesex County Council Gas Meter Testing Station, Edmonton.

July 1940, joined Royal Air Force.
March 1942, promoted Sergeant-Pilot.

April 10, 1942, killed in aircraft accident at Montrose.



Joyce Audrey Strowbridge

At School 1937-

Evacuated to St Albans with her uncle, Charles Richard Strowbridge.

November 1940, killed by direct hit on house.



Charles Richard Strowbridge

At School 1917-1919.

Member and Assistant Secretary of Higher Grade Old Boys' Football Club.

Branch Manager in North Metropolitan Electricity Supply Company.

November 1940, killed by direct hit on house at St Albans, together with wife, daughter, and niece (Joyce Strowbridge).



Frederick Arnold Thorpe

At School 1927-1933. Prefect, member of First School Cricket and Football Elevens.

Member of Old Boys' Cricket and Football Clubs.

Auditor with Messrs Rowley, Pemberton and Co., Gresham Street.

September 15, 1940, joined Royal Air Force.

1942, Wireless operator-air gunner. Sergeant. Forty-eight operational flights over Germany. Mentioned in Despatches for Distinguished Service.

September 10, 1942, killed returning from raid on Dusseldorf. Plane crashed and Thorpe attempted to save rear gunner. Petrol tanks exploded.



Victor Sydney Turner

At School 1937-1940.

Clerk with Messrs Barratt and Co., Ltd., and later with Messrs Campion and Pawle, Stock-brokers.

January 3, 1944, volunteered for Army: East Lancashire Regiment.

February 11, 1945, killed in action in Reichwald Forest.



Ronald Stanley Watts



At School 1929-1935. School Captain, member of School First Cricket and Football Elevens.

Member of Old Boys' Cricket and Football Clubs.

General Grade Clerk, London County Council. Later transferred to Government service, then back to London County Council, and finally Executive Officer in Board of Education.

October 14, 1940, joined Royal Air Force. Service deferred.

November 16, 1940, killed in air raid during first night at Bournemouth, where he had joined his evacuated Government Department while awaiting call-up notice.

Mavis Ruth Webb

At School 1944-

September 16, 1944, killed by rocket (V2) which demolished her home, killing every member of her family. She had been one week at School.

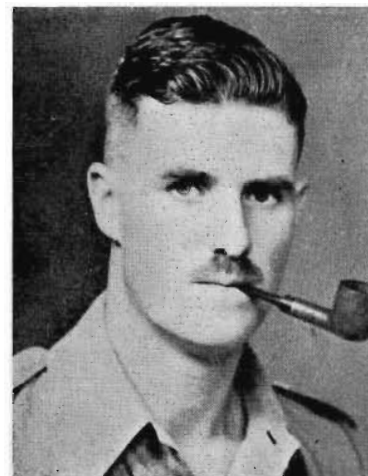


Leslie Williams

At School 1926-1930. Prefect. Member of Old Boys' Football Club. Articled Clerk with Messrs Frederick Warman, Estate Agents, later in Estate Office of Messrs Wm. Whiteley, Ltd.

Holder of Red Cross Bronze Medal for Voluntary Blood Transfusions.

May 18, 1938, enlisted in London Rifle Brigade.



July 10, 1941, gazetted 2nd Lieutenant 7/16 Punjab Regiment. April 1, 1942, promoted Lieutenant and Captain same day. March 15, 1943, promoted Brevet Major; June 15, promoted Major. At this period Commanding Officer at Sialkot, N.W.F.P., of the reserve Battalion of the 7/16th Battalion Punjab Regt. 1944, joined Service Battalion of 7/16th Battalion Punjab Regiment in the Field, as Second-in-Command; led Battalion for three months in action while Commanding Officer was in hospital. Passed Higher Examination in Urdu with credit. Mentioned in Dispatches.

March 6, 1945, killed while leading an attack at Tamandu, Arakan, Burma.

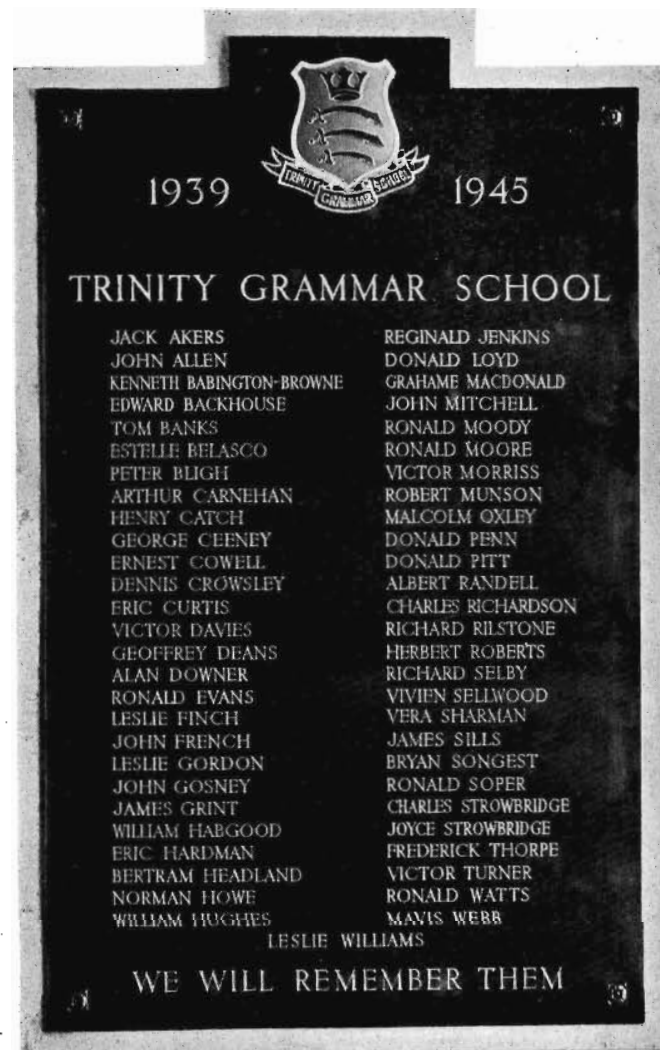
HYMN: "*He who would valiant be.*"
